We're delighted to announce we now have two new publications to add to the HRS Shop! Books 2 and 3 of the Arcade Series are now available to buy at Splash, Ryde Stamp Shop, and Collectors' Haven, in the arcade. Book 2 is called Ryde Art Treasures Exhibition 1881 - 1882. Prompted by Tony's purchase of the catalogue of this amazing exhibition, Diana trawled through the local newspapers of the time, and discovered what a fantastic event this was! Held to raise funds for the Ryde School of Art, which at the time was heavily in debt, the exhibition ran for an extended five weeks, and over 14000 people went through the doors of Ryde Town Hall, to view, what was acknowledged at the time, a once in a lifetime event. The logistics of arranging and looking after such an exhibition today are mind-boggling!

The Rotunda Images are complete!

The twelve images for the rotunda ceiling are now finished, and we are in the process of creating the vinyl panels which will go up in the arcade. The artists are: January - Martie Cain, February - Lisa Robinson, March - Jeff Please, April - Jan Rossetti, May - Rai Barker, June - Wendy Watkins, July - Marcia Mence, August - Loraine Payn, September - Sarah Combes, October -Lynne Phillips, November - Ben Spurling, December - Ann Stuart. They have been photographed and sent to be reproduced on vinyl. The rotunda panels are very surprisingly, nearly 5 feet high, and the paintings will be increased to that size. Then we will hire a cherry-picker or something similar, for the installation. If anyone has a cherry-picker, or knows someone who does, please shout now!









These are the images for January through to April, painted by Martie, Lisa, Jeff and Jan. These images will be reproduced as cards and a perpetual calendar, which we hope will boost profits for the society. We are so lucky to have so many talented artists on board.









May, June, July and August, painted by Rai, Wendy, Marcia and Loraine. There will be biographical details about each of the twelve artists on boards around the fountain area in the rotunda. This means that as everyone is looking up at the images, they will be able to read about the inspiration these talented folk used to create these wonderful designs.









These last four are September, October, November and December, painted by Sarah - a portrait of her beautiful eldest daughter, Alice, Lynne - Miss Plenty!- (this image has caused many a fluttering of the heart amongst the male members of the committee!) - November, by Ben, and December by Ann.

CATASTROPHE

Catastrophe is an exhibition which will be brought to Brading Roman Villa this month. In Iraq, before 2003, nearly 10,000 cultural artefacts were stored in air-raid shelters by staff at the Iraq National Museum. Objects in museums around the country were brought to a central location in Baghdad, where it was thought they would be safer. The most precious items were stored in the vault of the Central Bank.

The United Nations and the Hague Convention are working together to protect the heritage of the country, with limited success.

It is now acknowledged that over 12,000 artefacts relating to Iraq's heritage are missing. This exhibition aims to bring to the attention of a wider public the problems being faced by this beleaguered country, now in severe danger of losing its cultural heritage.


YOUR SOCIETY NEEDS YOU!

On Saturday, October 23rd, Historic Ryde Society has been invited to join with the Isle of Wight Industrial Archaeology Society to have a stand in Bembridge Village Hall to show the Isle of Wight what we have in mind for Ryde. We're delighted to be invited to this event, which will spread the word amongst a different group of people once again.

Patrick Nott, of the IWIAS has a particular interest in Henry Knight, who bought the Royal Victoria Arcade in July 1856, changing its entrance to how we see it today, in the autumn of that year. Henry was a very inventive man. He brought out four patents, and was responsible for the invention of a tin-opener, whose patent he sold to the firm of Crosse and Blackwell in 1880. The photograph shows one of the tin-openers, currently on display at the Guildhall Museum in Newport. Quite often, these tin-openers can be found on ebay.....or have a look in your kitchen cupboards. There may be a few more of them around!



Below is another of Henry's inventions, brought out in the early 1870s, and which proved very popular at the time. Henry's other patents included paint made from sand. Henry exhibited a Fairy fountain in the arcade in the 1860s, which was taken over to Portsmouth to entertain the French troops, and had and Damon will each present their installed in the arcade for over twenty years, an automatic weighing machine. He is also known to have exhibited a camera obscura in the same building.



UPDATES
